#### Dear Community,

Wendy Spencer spent a wonderful few days photographing your children outside in a natural setting. She is hoping to get pictures for you to view by Tuesday of this coming week- here is a message from her :



"NONE of the photographs will have been edited or cropped. When I photograph children or moving subjects, I choose not to change my focal point and therefore I move around so that my subject is often NOT centered or placed in the frame correctly. (An easy fix later which allows more spontaneous photography) I will NOT have time to edit them before sending them out for viewing.

I am frequently asked why I have taken more photographs of one student vs another. Easy answer: Some children NEED more photographs taken to GET the best shot.

The emailed folders for choosing will have the photographs in their "small format" and I will NOT put my watermark across the image as I find it covers too much. They will be much more "crisp" when delivered in their full size.

I am not a "normal" school photographer as I spend much more time with each student. I can not do it any other way as I feel it takes more than 2 or 3 shots to capture the child. For some, I'll take photographs of them jumping or climbing just to loosen them up so that they are relaxed and playful for their portraits.

If parents had forgotten that it was picture day and need a retake because of clothing or hair issues, that is fine to retake on Wednesday too.

There are a couple students that I would really like to retake as I felt that they were too nervous or scared. After a few sittings we moved into their wonderful play area after realizing that these wee little ones would be more comfortable there.

#### **GRADE 1**

#### **1st Grade**

The first graders began their Language Arts block on Monday and have begun the fabulous adventure of learning the letters and sounds that make up our language. This, like all things in Waldorf, is brought in a thoughtful and imaginative way through fairy tales and other stories from Native Alaskan cultures, and cultures from around the world. We have so far discovered the letters and sounds of M and B and have begun to uncover the letter P. They are learning how to correctly hold a pencil and how to form their letters, from heaven down to earth (top to bottom) and discovering their eye for beauty when a letter is done carefully and is well formed.





#### **GRADE 2**

We started our first language arts block. The excitement to read and write is high. We practiced our letter formation, started working on CVC words and "Friends of 'h'" and the 'st' sound at the beginning of words. We also had our first sunny day bog walk and the students had a great time building shelters inspired by The Ants and the Grasshopper story. This week we will continue with these concepts and introduce consonant blends, as well as start building our sight word list.

We started writing simple sentences this week, next week we will start building our word wall and continue exploring CVC words. Great discussions have been coming out of our fables and I hope for more of the same next week.





#### GRADE 3/4

3/4 entered their Measurement and Building block this week. They enjoyed learning the differences between Standard and None-Standard Units of measurement and thoroughly enjoyed hearing about all the fun ways to measure objects. They especially loved exploring the outdoors and measuring objects in our playground. 3/4 also had their first piece of homework sent home with them last week. Using a ruler and a piece of paper the students had to make their own Treasure Maps following a specific set of measurement guidelines. They had a blast with the activity and can't wait for their next piece of homework!




#### GRADE 5/6

This week the students in Grade 5/6 have been studying moss, ferns and horsetails, and conifers. Students created sun prints of the local ferns found on campus known as "Lady Ferns." They also collected different types of moss around campus, studied them closely, and came up with descriptions of the moss using similes. As they learn more and more about each plant family, their observational skills are developing and they are able to identify these plants on our walks and bike rides.
