### **SUNFLOWER KINDERGARTEN**

Literacy in a Waldorf kindergarten is based on a child's sensory experiences rather than in abstract symbols and concepts. We instead focus on facilitating literacy through singing, story telling, finger plays and reciting poems. We strive to grow a curiosity and desire to learn that comes from within the child, rather than it be rushed or pushed by outside expectations.

Children are naturally inquisitive and full of wonder. In the Waldorf kindergarten it is our primary goal to foster and protect this fleeting yet very important time of life.





#### **GRADE 1**



The first graders completed their first language arts block and headed into a math block. We completed our study, for now, of letters G and K. We are now looking around our world and asking ourselves, "which number is the greatest number?" They had a few ideas, mainly saying one number over another because it sounded big, or it was their favorite number.

But as we travel further into our block, we'll be exploring how we show quantities with different symbols. If I have a banana, I can show that I have one banana by writing a symbol: 1. Or I can use the Roman Numeral I, or I can write the word ONE. I could also draw a picture of one banana, which is how people first began to write things down (pictographs and hieroglyphs). It's so fun to discover this with them, and watch them learn something new that we adults tend to take completely for granted!



### **GRADE 2**



Grade 1/2 is wrapping up our first week of Autumn. Temperatures are dropping but that has not slowed down our young spirits. A big thank you to the parents for making sure that the students are prepared every day with hearty lunches and warm waterproof clothing. We performed in the Michaelmas Play over the weekend and

the performance left me in awe. We all practiced so hard and to see them get a chance to perform in such a magical way was breathtaking.

Our first Math Block has been fantastic so far. We are beginning to use place value and regrouping as well as strengthen and grow our ability to skip-count. We also had our Wilderness Day on Monday. The students learned how to select dry material to make a fire and watched a "bow drill" fire made from scratch.



### GRADE 3/4

The students ended the week making an authentic deep dish pizza with Mr. Unterberger who is a native to Chicago. We are so grateful to him for helping us make a delicious pizza!




### GRADE 7/8
